LEE RETREATS ACROSS THE POTOMAC!

HS ARMY TERRIBLY SHATTERED!

LOSS OF MUCH OF HIS BAGGAGE!

Chambersburg, July 14—P.M. Official information has just been received at the headquarters of Gen. Couch that Gen. Lee completed his pontoon bridge at Williamsport yesterday, and crossed his entire army over the Potomac last night.

Most of his artillery was got over safely, but considerable of his baggage and a number of his horses were lost in the river. Part of his army and trains forded the river, so great was Lee's haste to retreat, and the loss of wagons and horses was heavy.

Gen. Kilpatrick entered Williamsport this morning with his Cavalry, and the entire line of the Potomac is now held by the Union troops.

This ends the second and last rebel invasion. Gen. Lee came upon loyal soil this time with the finest army the so-called Confederacy ever possessed, and it retreats upon its own desolated soil with its columns broken, its numbers reduced nearly if not quite one-half by deaths, wounds, captures and desertions in the brief space of thirty days!
