The Southern Opposition Party.

In our last issue we demonstrated from

the pages of history that there has been

nothing in the policy or conduct of the De-

mocratic party justly calculated to drive

Southern patriots into "coalition" with

Northern fanatics, in order to "extirpate it

forever." We showed that, on the contra-

ry, the United States, under its auspices,

and in spite of the Opposition, had grown

and prospered and gone on "conquering

and to conquer," until at this moment they

occupy the proudest position among the na-

tions of the earth—that so wise and patri-

otical had been the uniform course of that par-

ty—so congenial with the habits and incli-

nations of a free and republican people—

that whenever, by accident or trick, their

opponents had come into power, uniformly

at the very first instance, the people had

condemned them, and generally, by over-

whelming majorities, restored the Democ-

racy to those sacred trusts which they, by

long experience, had been found so much

more capable to fill. This undeniable his-

tory teaches one of two things, as our friends

of the "Holy Alliance" must admit—either

that the people, who have done this thing,

are incapable of self-government and ought

therefore, as the despot of the other "Ho-

ly Alliance" of 1815 believed, to be shown

of their power, or else that the Democratic

party is worthy of the confidence of all good

men—a noble and patriotic party—and that

the violent hatred and extirpating spirit

now sought to be excited against it, is the

work of wicked men, to foster private and

sinister purposes. We cannot well see how

Mr. Bott's tail can extricate itself from this

"split stick." Come, gentlemen; tell the

honest masses whom you are endeavoring to

carry away, you, which is your position—

to alienate them, as fools, incapable of

self-government, or to lead them astray for

the promotion of your own ambitious pur-

poses, and for the destruction of liberty?

The most amusing feature in the action of

the Southern Opposition, is to denounce the

Democracy as a sectional party, and for the

correction of this vice of sectionality, to in-

voke the aid and co-operation of the Black

Republincans, an organization as essentially

sectional, that is the last Presidential can-
