PROCLAMATION BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE CONFEDERATE STATES.

The Senate and House of Representatives of the Confederate States of America have signified their desire that a day be set apart and observed as a day of humiliation, fasting and prayer.

It is hereby proclaimed that the day of Monday, the 12th day of April, 1864, shall be a day of public fasting and prayer.

It is the duty of every citizen of the Confederate States to observe this day with solemnity and devotion.

Given under my hand and the seal of the Confederate States at the City of Richmond, this 1st day of April, 1864.
