Virginia Statistics.

The First Auditor of Virginia reports the value of real estate and slaves in the State as follows:

Value of real estate, \$47,499,885.54.

" Slaves, 313,459,200.

The total wealth of the State including slaves and all other kinds of property, is estimated at \$1,148,876,097.58, which divided between the white population gives to each person \$1,000.58.

The debt of Virginia is \$29,100,559, the annual interest of which is \$1,787,928.

The number of land owners &c. in Augusta county is as follows:

Number of Landowners, 297.

" Acres held, 67,700.

Value of land and buildings, \$19,147.00.

Aggregate of money, bonds, &c., \$1,077,194.

The aggregate value of all personal property in the county, not exempt from taxation, including money, bonds, &c., is \$1,437,194.

The amount paid into the State Treasury by Augusta county in 1859, is given as follows:

Tax on real estate, \$41,166.

" personal property, 10,027.57.

Total revenue, \$51,193.67.

The taxes assessed on licenses are thus classed:

Monarchs, \$4,662.74.

" Drunks, 297.67.

Boatmen, 300.00.

Attorneys, 10.00.

Physicians, 15.00.

Other privileges and permits, 2,026.53.

Aggregate, \$1,077,194.

It must be remembered that large portions of Augusta and several of the other counties are mountainous, and not worth ten cents per acre; but still the disproportion between \$41 in Jefferson and \$4,662 in Wythe is rather remarkable.

Augusta is about all the counties in the number of horses, mules, asses and Joe.

We have \$7,234; Loudoun \$3,797, and Rockingham \$7,710. Rockingham leads off in the number of cattle, sheep and hogs, having 44,463, to our 38,154. Loudoun is great on cattle, having 2,214; Rockingham comes next with 2,068, and Augusta follows with 1,770. In wealth Augusta is ahead again. She has 1,377, Albemarle 1,063; Loudoun 838, and Rockingham 770. Of pianos and harps, Albemarle has 190; Augusta 180; Loudoun 121; Rockingham 57, and Clay 1. Augusta is also far ahead of all the counties in the number of carriages, buggies and other vehicles of the same class. She has 1,184; Loudoun 927; Albemarle 727; Rockingham 654, Clay 0. But when we come to horses of and over 12 years of age, we lag behind. Albemarle has 7,644; Little Prince Edward 4,301, and August 3,978.

The value of land and buildings in Augusta, as reported, is \$120,200 less than in 1858, and the aggregate amount of money, bonds, &c. is \$16,340 less.

New Publications.

Sketches of the History of Another World.

This is the title of a curious work just issued from the press of J. H. Lippincott & Co., Philadelphia, and for sale by H. Cowan. It is from the pen of Robert Dale Owen, formerly member of Congress, and Minister to Naples. The question of "spiritual manifestations," or to use the author's term, "ultramundane interferences" is ingeniously and ably discussed, and illustrated by curious stories of ghosts and bogies, haunted houses, magnetic phenomena &c., the whole forming a large and entertaining volume, well calculated to make the hairs of the head stand up in astonishment. These feed of the marvellous, whose principles are too firmly fixed to be moved by certain heterodox notions presented to me by the "foot-fall" with-out danger; but we cannot command this book to those of a timid nature or wavering disposition. A nervous soul who retires to rest at midnight after indulging too freely in Mr. Owen's banishments, would be very apt to become a convert to his ghoulish theory before morning.

The Slave's Tale of the Times of Howe and Hamilton. J. B. Lippincott & Co., Philadelphia. This is another originally series from the pen of James J. Parsons. The author deems his biography to reduce the character Sherman from luteny, and drag Hamilton down from the high place which he occupies in the hearts of his countrymen. He confesses, however, in the preface to the work, to a strong prejudice against the greatest statesman. The book may be read with interest, but cannot give my unbiased change in the estimate which he has formed from philosophy upon the two men.—\$1.00 each by J. B. Cowan.
