JOHN BELL, IN FAVOR OF THE CONSTITUTION IN ALL ITS ASPECTS.

SLAVERY A GREAT CIVIL, MORAL, SOCIAL, RELIGIOUS AND POLITICAL INSTITUTION.

PHILOSOPHICAL AND STATESMAN-LIKE VIEW OF SLAVERY.

Extract from a speech by Hon. John Bell, in the Senate of the United States, on the 6th of July, 1850, in relation to the Fugitive Slave Law.

The forbearance of the North to apply the Fugitive Law (to New Mexico)—a proposition so justly obnoxious to, and giving rise to so much excitement at the South—is a concession to Southern feelings which I would not seek to depreciate; but it can only be regarded, under all the circumstances, as a concession to the spirit of the Constitution, and not as a concession to the principles and position of the North.

THE CONSTITUTION PROTECTS SLAVERY IN THE TERRITORIES.

It is contended that the South is secured in the full benefit of the doctrine held by some of the most distinguished champions of its right, who maintain the Constitution, *proprio jure*, that the fugitive slave is the citizen of the Territory to which he is sent, and that the protection of the Law and Constitution of the United States is in FAVOR OF A CONSTITUTIONAL UNION, AND NOT IN FAVOR OF A UNION OF FORCE.

The cause of Freedom in the South, as well as in the North, is wrapped in the same mantle, and in the Union. These once broken down, and military despotism becomes our inheritance. We have arrived at a point of time in our history, which will constitute an epoch, to which the future historians will refer, and from which the cause of Freedom in this country, of increased property, and of a nation, or of a man who loves his country, no man who has any just pride in the Nation that he is an American citizen, but must desire that these discontents should cease.
