Reasons in the North.

The reason thought of by the people of the North is beginning to have its effect, and the desire for peace is beginning to manifest itself. Such sentiments are beginning to be expressed in Iowa, Connecticut and New Jersey, and it will not be long before a very palpable reaction will be extended to all of the Northern States. The sensitive pocket now is beginning to be averted and will soon be in spasmodic convulsions. They have now 100,000 troops in the field, and an expense of \$20,000,000 per month, and find that 200,000 men were needed, which will involve an expense of \$40,000,000 per month. A debt of countless millions, total prostration of business, and consequent poverty and want are beginning to stare them in the face. In New York a reaction has already begun to manifest itself, and the New York Vocs say that, "if a mass meeting could be convened in New York City of all who are really in favor of immediate peace, even at the cost of the Confederate States, it would outnumber the monster Union manifestation of seven weeks ago, and be characterized by an earnestness and sincerity that were wanting on that occasion." The war spirit has greatly subsided, and it cannot be so stimulated to its former furious madness, unless it be effected by an invasion of their territory. If we remain upon our own soil with a sufficient force to drive the enemy out and to be able to prevent them from coming in at any point, the war will soon be ended, by the enormous expense to which they will necessarily be subjected. When they find that they are winning no laurels, gaining no victories, a quaking no glory, making no progress in subjugating the South, and only impoverishing and anguishing their own section, they will realize the wisdom of acknowledging our independence.

Patriotic Upliftings in Missouri.

Gov. Jackson has issued a proclamation to the people of Missouri, calling for 50,000 troops to repel the invasion of the Washington aspirers. He reviews the transactions between the State and Federal authorities. He says an arrangement was made with Gen. Harney by which the peace of the State might be preserved. The it was wantonly and wickedly violated by the Federal authority, which removed Gen. Harney and substituted a lame lion for him. His states that he made another effort for peace, and had an interview with Gen. Lyon, who avowed his purpose to occupy the State at pleasure, and reduce it to a condition of subjugation similar to that of Maryland. The Governor, therefore, seeing the wicked designs of the Federal power, and despairing of maintaining the liberties of the people, except by arms, calls upon them to rally to the defence of their homes and friends.

Skirmish near Laurel Hill—Eight of the Enemy Killed.

We have learned from a reliable gentleman of this place, who returns a few days since from our camp at Laurel Hill this side of Phillips, that on Tuesday night last, one of our scouting parties, numbering 25, met a scouting party of the enemy, numbering about 50, within less than two miles of our camp at Laurel Hill. Both parties fired, and both retreated. None of our men were hurt. A body being in that neighborhood wrote to a friend in Huttonville that the enemy buried eight the next morning. Our party retreated because they supposed from what they had learned previously that the scouting party of the enemy consisted of about 500.
