COLLECTION OF TAXES.

The mede of collecting the taxes of the State is one that eminently needs reform, and deserves the prompt action of the General Assembly. By the present law for per cent, is allowed for the collection of the reteaue. The collection of \$25.000,000, the interest on the public debt, costs the State \$122,000. For the collection of the license tax a tess sum is allowed. The report of the Auditor shows that from 1832 to 1850, a period of seven years, there was in the hands of sheriffs, uncollected, of principal and interest, above \$446,000, liere was a sum of fixelf more than sufficient to pay for the collection of all the taxes of the State in the sieds by which they are collected in other States. But a great deal of time is expended by the Legislature at every assession, is considering petitions and passing bligs to relieve the securities of defaulting sheriff from judgment and demages awarded against them for the fallure of their principals to pay into the judgment and damages awarded against them for the fallure of their principals to pay into the treasury the revenue collected by them. This is only a part of the evil growing out of the system. The sheriff or the deputy, to whom he farms the office, becomes a "saper shaver," and the tax paid by the people is not unfrequently used for purposes of aziortion and usury. Habits of ex-travaganes are often centracted in the sheriff by the long use of money not his own, he becomes a defaulter, and the people and the Sinte are the losers.
