Leavenworth, Craft and Kaufman were appointed a Committee on Mathematics. On Friday afternoon a lively discussion on the subject of Text Books occurred. A. H. Bellows presented a system of Partnership. The Committee on Resolutions reported the following:

Resolved. That the thanks of this Institute are due, and are hereby tendered the Lutheran and German Reformed congregations, for the use of their church on this occasion.

Resolved. That the thanks of this Institute be tendered Mr. Stark for the comfortableness of the church during the Institute's session.

Resolved. That in our opinion the County Superintendent is the right arm of the school system, and that any attempt to abolish it should be frowned upon by every friend of education.

Resolved. That we heartily approve of the course pursued by our able and worthy Superintendent, in his examination visits to schools, and in every other respect; and that, by his energy and perseverance, he has endeared himself to every friend of education, and that we will uphold and sustain him in every effort put forth for the advancement of the glorious cause of education.

Resolved. That the thanks of this Institute are hereby tendered the citizens of Strasburg and vicinity, for encouragement given, and by their presence at our meetings, and that we will ever remember their kindness with gratitude.

Resolved. That we believe that it is the imperative duty of every teacher to use every means in his power to fully prepare himself for the discharge of his responsible duties as teacher; and as a means of such improvement, we believe that every teacher who possibly can, should attend the Normal School, at Chamberville, to be opened in October.

Resolved. That the proceedings be published in the "Pennsylvania School Journal," and in the County papers.
