Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen, and Members of the Olden Literary Society.

The Law, as a science, has engaged the attention of the wisest men, the purest minds, and the brightest intellects...

But it is not of the Law, as a Science, that I purpose addressing you tonight. My object is to review the law as administered in Pennsylvania in times whereof the memory of no living man remaineth...

I have always thought that we, as a people, have been greatly favored by a benignant Providence, and that the lives of men, and the conduct of measures, were overruled for our special benefit.

How else can we account for the fact that WILLIAM PENN, the heir and hope of one of England's proudest nobles, should in his early life abandon the pleasures of youth, the smiles of his Sovereign, and his chance of preferment at Court...

We, as Pennsylvanians, may therefore justly be proud of the great founder of our noble Commonwealth, notwithstanding the aspersions thrown upon his character by my illustrious namesake, Baron Macau...

inforced in force, I cannot say, but certainly the veriest tyrant in the profession would not hesitatingly say that it would have been at any time "more honored in the breach than in the observance," especially as by it, open and notorious Perjury was only punished by a Fine of £5.

Among the greatest innovations made in the last century, in the law as previously administered in this State, was that occasioned by the passage of the "Arbitration Act" of 1705.

By the Act of 1705, persons having accounts to produce one against another, were allowed to consent to a rule of Court, for referring the adjustment thereof to certain persons mutually chosen by them in open Court...

Still it cannot be denied, but that the Arbitration Act of 1705, although it did not "starve out" the legal fraternity was productive of good. Under its operation immense numbers of disputes were peaceably adjusted...

The changes made in the Criminal Law, during the last century were equally as radical and striking as those in the civil law. The sanguinary punishments inflicted under the English Laws were unpleasing to our forefathers...

During nearly one hundred years preceding the settlement of Pennsylvania, few of our Judges were acquainted with the principles of the law, or knew anything about its practice before their appointment...

And yet the business of the country in that day was done, and well done too. The Judges were generally selected because of their old and proven sagacity of character...

important interests committed to their charge. Gentleman eminent for their legal abilities and oratorical powers practiced before them and by the gravity of their demeanor and respectful behavior, shed lustre upon the proceedings...

The County of Franklin, as is no doubt well known to most of you, was erected out of the South western part of the County of Cumberland, by an act of the General Assembly of this Commonwealth...

The first Court held in our County convened on the 15th of September 1784 in the second story of John Jack's Tavern...

Col. Benjamin Chambers made his first improvement at this place about the year 1750. It was a log house, and stood on the lower part of the lot where Hon. Geo. Chambers now resides...

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a distance of fifty miles, rarely, and I doubt not willing, for a consultation of course, to aid with his advice and services, all who might be in trouble...

The only act done at the first term of our Court, so far as I can ascertain from the Records, was the admission of John Clark Esq. who having made it to appear to the Court that he had previously been admitted an attorney in the Supreme Court...

At the second Term of our Courts, in December 1784, on Motion of Mr. Clark, Robert Nagaw, Thomas Hartley, James Hamilton, Thomas Danner, Thomas Smith, Ross Thomson, Ralph Bowie, James Ross, Jane Riddle, Stephen Chambers and John McDowell were admitted to our Bar...

Our town presented quite a different appearance in 1784, from what it does at present. The Conococheague creek flowing along its natural channel quietly and smoothly, unobstructed by any man's improvements...

There were very few improvements east of Second Street. The Falling Spring was its northern, and the Conococheague Creek its western boundary. Main Street was not then opened north of the Falling Spring, as the ground between it and the place where the Rev. Jos. Clark now resides...

Immediately around the "Diamond" is the centre of our town has been called from time immemorial, there were but few improvements. Hugh Gibb who was married to the widow of Robert Jack, dec'd, kept tavern in a small two story log house...

The other lots fronting on the Diamond were then unimproved. A large walnut tree stood near the corner of the lot where Mr. John Noel now resides...

It has long been a mooted question whether John Jack ever kept a tavern in the stone house now belonging to Mr. A. J. Miller. He purchased the lot from Col. Benjamin Chambers in March, 1775, and by a clause in the deed was bound to build a house within two years thereafter...
