News of the Week.

During the past week the panic in the financial and commercial circles has spread to an alarming extent. GRANTLEY is likely to be accommodated to his heart's desire. He has openly demanded at the hands of the Republican party...

Accounts from Boston say that for the past thirty years there has not been seen such long faces among her business men as at the present time. It was generally admitted on all sides that the commercial horizon betokened a long and destructive storm.

Several heavy failures have taken place in New York, within the past week, by firms largely engaged in the Southern trade. Great uneasiness prevails in all business circles in that city.

What Has Been Gained.

It is to be hoped the lesson the country is now undergoing will not be lost upon it. Political villains, longing for plunder, have by unceasing outcry influenced the Northern States to elect a President upon a platform deadly hostile to the dearest interests of the South.

The poor men who were cajoled into voting for LINCOLN under promise of "better times," can now see the injury they have been led to inflict upon themselves and upon the country. Their chance for work at living prices is worse now than it was a few months ago.

Let Pennsylvania Vote with Virginia to Save the Union.

We have watched with an anxious eye the movements now going on at the South. We believed that the election of LINCOLN would induce some of the Southern States to withdraw from the Union. Our fears did not magnify the danger.

But we do not yet despair of the Union. There is encouragement in the attitude of Virginia, that ancient and glorious commonwealth, which never loses sight of true principles and never swerves from the path of patriotism.

The present would seem to be a proper time for the final adjustment of the questions in dispute between the North and the South. The quarrel has gone on too long already. Let the two sections sit down calmly together and talk over the points in issue, and if agreement is out of the question, let them peaceably separate.

Now in spite of this law, we venture to affirm that the people of Pennsylvania are not opposed to the recapture of runaway negroes and are not in favor of obstructing the execution of the fugitive slave law.

Let this subject be agitated. Let the press, or at least the Democratic portion of it, speak out for repeal. Let the people petition the Legislature to wipe out our nullifying law.

Depend on the Issue.

Republican politicians who took a prominent part in the late canvass in Pennsylvania, have not hesitated to predict that LINCOLN will disappoint the hopes of his own party and pursue a conservative line of policy.

There will probably be a separation of one or more States from the Union before the obnoxious laws passed by some of the Northern States can possibly be repealed. But the separation will not be final if Pennsylvania, responding to the patriotic suggestions of Virginia, shall set her sister States of the North the example of repealing a law conceived in unreasonable hostility to the South.

MONTGOMERY, who labored with old BROWN and other free State scoundrels to keep up civil war in Kansas for the benefit of Black Republicanism and who had been quiet for some time, has created fresh disturbances.

THADDEUS HYATT, one of the New York contributors to old BROWN's murdering expedition to Virginia, and who was imprisoned at Washington by the Senate Committee for refusing to testify, went to Kansas after his release last summer.

Did HYATT arrange this new outbreak in Kansas? Did he give the President's hundred dollars to suffering settlers, or did he invest it in rifles and bullets for MONTGOMERY and his murdering gang?

To us it has always been a marvel how these murdering gangs could go about in Kansas without being captured and hung. Our army is not as large as the armies of first class European powers, but it is certainly large enough to surround and capture a band of a few hundred robbers and murderers.

The thing to be done in Kansas now, is to catch MONTGOMERY and all his band and hang them. Nothing less than that will do. If there are not troops enough there now to do it effectually and without fail, let them be poured in by every road leading to the Territory.

Begging a Notice.

The inhabitants of this commonwealth can go on the soil of Maryland or Virginia and reclaim any property of theirs that may have found its way thither and there is nothing to hinder them.

While we cry out for the preservation of the Union, let us not forget that our statute book is blackened with a law which violates the spirit if not the very letter of the common bond. While we raise our voice against a dismemberment of the confederacy, let us be certain that we have given our Southern brethren no just cause for leaving us.

Black, of Pennsylvania, at present Attorney General of the United States, will be appointed to the position made vacant by the resignation of the venerable and patriotic Taney.

Mississippi.

As another result following the election of LINCOLN the notorious banit MONTGOMERY, and his band, have felt encouraged to make a second Abolition raid in Kansas. He has organized a force of about 500 men, through aid and arms furnished by sympathizers in the East, and proposes not only resistance to the United States authority in Kansas, but open hostilities against the people upon the borders of Missouri, Arkansas and Texas, with a view to free the slaves in those States. The Republicans express themselves as being very anxious that the Government should crush out all disturbance in the South, we hope they will show the same anxiety to have the disturbers of the peace and safety of the country in Kansas summarily dealt with. The latest intelligence from the South indicates no abatement in the secession excitement. The States are preparing for holding Secession Conventions for the purpose of considering the matter and adopting measures for uniting the whole South in the movement. Mr. FORSYTH, the leader of the Douglas party in Alabama, says, that "the first act of the Convention should be to declare Alabama out of the Union, and then proceed to form alliances with other southern States and foreign nations." Mr. FORSYTH will carry the whole Douglas party with him, in that State, in the Disunion movement. Mr. DOUGLAS, and his friends, who contributed so much towards the election of LINCOLN, by dividing and distracting the Democratic party, can now eat the bitter fruits of their folly. The President elect, Mr. LINCOLN, visited Chicago on the 21st inst.—There was no demonstration. He put up at the Tremont House like any ordinary visitor. He would wait a few days for Mr. HAMLIN when they would meet for the first time. The Baltimore papers say that Mr. Lincoln's recent speech, at Springfield, makes no impression in that city, and gives no confidence in regard to a settlement of the Southern difficulties. The latest accounts from Oregon represent it as probable that Lincoln has carried that State. The result was brought about by a large number of the Douglas Democrats going over to the Republicans. The election returns from California show that the entire number of votes in the Southern States has been 111,816 of which Lincoln had 88,588.

Give Them Their Share.

The Republicans are not entitled to all the credit of the present distracted financial and political condition of the country. A fair share of it is due to the malignant DOUGLAS leaders, who broke up the Democratic party because it would not fall down and worship a very small specimen of mankind called the "Little Giant." With several millions of Democrats to choose from, these men would agree to none but one who had for three years affiliated with Black Republicans and belched his vulgar abuse upon a Democratic administration. The DOUGLAS delegates from Pennsylvania who crept into the National Convention by concealing their preference for the little traitor, ought especially to receive their due share of credit for producing the bank suspension and financial crisis we are at this moment suffering from. And those of them who labored assiduously up to the last moment to aid LINCOLN by circulating the straight DOUGLAS ticket, should be put before all the rest when the suffering people come to return thanks to the authors of their troubles. If the Democratic party had not been defeated, the country would have escaped this revision; and if DOUGLAS had been kicked out of the party when he first began to kick against it three years ago, it would now be successful and the country would be safe. Therefore let the men who have upheld him as a Democrat when he was plainly a traitor, be remembered for their agency in producing this panic and suspension.
