Maryland.

There is no man no matter what his opinions may be, in reference to the war policy of the present administration, but must feel utterly disgusted with the belligerent attitude Maryland has assumed towards the Federal Government. It has all the characteristics of genuine Plug Uglyism without a single redeeming feature to recommend it.

Since writing the above the papers state that a fresh requisition for troops has been made on this State and that the Governor will order out twenty eight regiments including those already in the field. This will make the total number of men to be furnished by this State, 29,500.

It is the general remark here, and we note it with much pleasure, that the conduct of the soldiers assembled at this place has, so far, been perfectly decorous and respectful towards our citizens. Beds, and everything necessary for the comfort of the sick, have been prepared under the direction of Surgeon THEOBALD and his Assistants; and those who may take sick at the encampment will at once be removed to these quarters where they will be under the care of skillful physicians and attentive nurses.
