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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Demand for Four Hundred Thousand Men and Four Hundred Millions of Dollars.

Fellow Citizens of the Senate and of the House of Representatives:

Having been convened on an extraordinary occasion, authorized by the constitution...

At the beginning of the present Presidential term, four months ago, the functions of the Federal government were found to be generally suspended...

Within these States all the forts, arsenals, dock yards, custom houses, and the like, including the movable and stationary property...

The forts thus seized had been put in improved condition, new ones had been built, and armed forces had been organized...

A large number of the Federal militia were organized, and the militia of the several States were called upon...

Army Movements. Our latest information from Gen. Patterson's forces, at Martinsburg, report all quiet and anxiously waiting reinforcements of men and cannon...

The Government has been sending on reinforcements with the greatest activity. On Sunday two regiments from Washington passed through this place for Martinsburg, with rifle cannon, passed over the Franklin Railroad.

From the Report of the Secretary of War, we learn that under the call of the 15th of April, for seventy-five thousand Volunteers for three months, there are now in the service of the U. States: Regulars and volunteers for 3 months and for the war: 206,000. Total force now in the service: 206,000.
