Another Battle—Gen. Garnett Killed. A special dispatch to the Commercial Advertiser, dated at Fairfax, Va. Thursday night (the Morris' column) commenced the pursuit, and the next afternoon, after a tarted forced march through rain and mud over Laurel mountain, our advance column upon the enemy at Carrick's Ford, eight miles south of St. George, Tucker county.

The rebels drew up in line of battle and poured a raking volley on the right of our column, the Ohio Fourteenth, which returned it, and a hot fire, lasting 20 minutes, was kept up, when Dumont's Indiana Seventh made a charge upon their battery. They broke and ran, crossing the ford towards St. George.

Gen. Dumont commenced the chase for two hours, and then bivouacked. The other portion of the column bivouacked on the field of battle.

The rebels lost all their tents, camp equipage, army chests, clothing, hundreds of knapsacks and mackets, with large quantities of ammunition.

The following is the (Special report) of the battle of Carrick's Ford, dated Hagerstown, Md., July 15, 1861: To Col. E. D. Townsend, Adj. Gen. of the Army: Gen. Garnett and his forces have been routed and his baggage and one gun taken, and his army completely demoralized.
